## **Topic 1: Writing a Childhood Memoir**

Format: Interview with Loretta Tolnai Interviewer: Asha Rajan Date: 1 February

# March 2023

Topic 4: Introduction to Poetry & Ekphrasis Format: Workshops Tutor: Aileen Boyer Dates: March 1, 8, 15, 22 Time: 9.30am – 12 midday Poetry is a way to understand and feel our world. It can

be a beacon in the dark and a guide in life. This short course will help you understand the importance of poetry in your own world and introduce you to some simple forms to express your own feelings. Starting from the beginning, because poetry has been around since then, we will take a closer look at form and function in a fun way that will have you writing your own poetry with confidence. Suitable for beginners and those wanting to get creative through personal expression, this step- by- step course will guide you through the process of poetry making.

Topic 5: Shut up and Write Format: Timed writing sprints Hostess: Asha Rajan Date: 29 March Times: 9.30am – 12.30pm Including 2 breaks of 15 minutes and writing prompts for those who need it. This is an opportunity to write in uninterrupted blocks using the Pomodoro Technique. Prompts will be provided for those who need them or feel free to bring a current work in progress (short story, series of poems, whatever you're working on at the moment) and write. Bring device/laptop if that's what you use or whatever you'd like to write on.

# April 2023

Topic 6: Grief Writing Format: Workshops Tutor: Asha Rajan Dates: April 5, 12, 19, 26 Time: 9.30am – 12 midday This series of workshops will explore the key elements of grief writing, facilitated by Asha Rajan. Learn how to write a short story or poem on the topic of grief and edit it in preparation for submission to the 2023 Grieve Anthology through the Hunter Writers Centre. Asha's piece, 'My Father's Hands', was published in the 2021 Grieve Anthology).

You can work towards a short story or poem or series of poems or creative nonfiction piece or pieces for submission.

# May 2023

Topic 7: Write Your Novel Format: Workshops Tutor: Helen Iles Dates: May 3, 10, 17, 24

# Time: 9.30am – 12 midday

This novel-writing course will take you step by step through the process of planning and writing your first novel or kick-starting a stalled one. Learn techniques to grow your ideas and create the complications of plot publishers require through proven methods of story creation. Develop unique characters and throw them into dilemmas that create suspense through pacing and impactive writing that will keep the reader turning pages. Then we look at first draft editing and manuscript presentation.

## **Topic 8: Marketing your Book**

Format: One off Workshop Tutor: Helen Iles Date: 31 May Time: 9.30am – 12 midday

The success of any book is in direct relation to its promotional campaign. If you have a book that should be in the public eye, this three-hour session is for you.

Topics covered: Pre-launch promotions, the Book Launch, getting a following; Keeping your book in the public's eye; social media; book trailers; author talks, printed material. For books yet to be released and for books whose sales have stalled.

#### June 2023

Topic 9: Memoir and writing from life (Nonfiction) Format: Workshops Tutor: Helen Iles Dates: June 7, 14, 21, 28 Time: 9.30am – 12 midday Life writing encompasses writing true accounts in ways to engage and hold a reader's interest. Memoirs, biographies, anecdotes, essays, instructional texts, and true crime fall into this category. Research, writing style and using different voices or perspectives to capture the reader are just some aspects that will be covered.

## July 2023

Topic 10: Crime Writing Format: Workshops Tutor: Helen Iles Dates: July 5, 12, 19, 26 Time: 9.30am – 12 midday Turn your criminal mind loose in this course where you

will learn to create a suspenseful story that readers can't put down. We will cover the core elements of crime writing, memorable sleuths, cunning villains, crime types, planting clues and how to devise an unforgettable ending.

## August 2023

Topic 11: Editing Format: Workshops Tutor: Helen Iles Dates: August 2, 9, 16, 23 Time: 9.30am – 12 midday

Anyone can tell a story, but can you write it with pizzaz? Can you catch and hold the reader and leave them remembering your superb metaphors? Can you write economically and put punch in your scenes? In these sessions, we will cover the basic rules of grammar, and dissect your writing to make it gleam with perfection and develop different writing styles.

#### **Topic 12: Writing Historical Fiction**

Format: One off Workshop Tutor: Lyn Bodycoat Date: 30 August Time: 9.30am – 12 midday Topics covered:

\*How to utilize your photos

- \*How to get started on your writing
- \*How to structure and pace your writing

\*How to make your writing interesting for your reader. Lyn will use her three published texts to show you examples of the dot-points above.

#### September 2023

Topic 13: Very Short Stories Format: Workshops Tutor: Asha Rajan Dates: September 6, 13, 20, 27 Time: 9.30am – 12 midday

Can you convey a whole story in a tight word count? People often think flash and micro fiction are easy to write because they're short, but the short word count means you have to choose your words carefully. In this course we'll look at various very short stories and the difference between flash and micro fiction. We'll explore what makes these tiny stories successful or not, and how you can adopt successful techniques to write a complete story within the constraints of the word count.

The workshop covers pitfalls and common mistakes; good and bad examples of erotic writing; and sexy writing exercises.

Topic 17: Create a Vivid Sense of Place in Your Writing Format: One off Workshop Tutor: Maria Bonar Date: 25 October Times: 9.30am – 12midday A vivid sense of place enhances the mood, atmosphere and context of your writing and brings the world of your story alive for the reader. It anchors your writing and can provide authenticity. Presented by Maria Bonar.

Topic 18: Writing for Children Format: Workshops Tutor: Helen Iles Dates: November 1, 8, 15, 22 Time: 9.30am – 12midday Writing for Children will cover children's picture books for littlies and young readers, and also encompass writing for the pre-teen. Sessions cover language, format, illustrating your work and avenues of publication. How to produce a picture book when you can't draw!
